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INTRODUCTION

Pneuma Christian Academy, a ministry of Pneuma Church, is a Christian school in Miami, Florida, that offers a strong educational program that embraces a Christian Bible based worldview.

As a ministry of Pneuma Church, Inc, Pneuma Christian Academy seeks to develop future generations by developing their minds and fostering a Christ-like character. Guided by Colossians 1:28, we embrace our call to “. . .tell others about Christ, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all the wisdom God has given us. We want to present them to God, perfect in their relationship to Christ.” (NLT)

We, therefore, endeavor to educate children in the necessary subjects and skills from a Christian perspective so that children may become all that Christ has intended for the purposes of the expansion of His Kingdom here on earth.

We believe that education is a partnership between parents and the school, and are grateful to the parents who entrust us their children’s lives and education. Pneuma Christian Academy is committed in this partnership as we seek to provide high quality education and spiritually enriching discipleship leading young minds to develop critical thinking through a Biblical lens. The curriculums we have chosen reflect our values and statement of faith.

We are thankful that as parents committed to providing your child a quality Christian education and are willing to make the sacrifices necessary to transform your child’s mind and heart (Rev. 3:20). We at Pneuma Christian Academy commit to partner with you to give your child an affordable private education that emphasizes Bible knowledge, advanced phonics, writing, mathematics, and science and other important academic disciplines.

As we journey together in a mutual commitment to your children, we humbly request your prayers that we might accomplish all we can for Christ’s glory.

MISSION STATEMENT

Pneuma Christian Academy's mission is to provide students with a first-rate education based on a solid biblical foundation so that they can develop into Kingdom leaders and world influencers with strong godly convictions who are prepared to effectively impact every sphere of society.

STATEMENT OF FAITH

(As stated at the Bylaws of Pneuma Church Inc)

A. The Trinity.

It is the testimony of both the Old and New Testaments and of the Christian Church that God is both One and Triune. The biblical revelation testifies that there is only one God and that He is eternally existent in three persons— Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

B. God the Father.

God the Father is the creator and sustainer of all things, and He created the universe in love. He created man in His own image for fellowship and called man back to Himself through Christ after the rebellion and fall of man.

C. The Son.

Jesus Christ is eternally God. He was together with the Father and the Holy Spirit from the beginning, and through Him all things were made. For man's redemption, He left heaven and became incarnate by the Holy Spirit through the virgin Mary; henceforth, He is forever one Christ with two natures—God and man—in one person.

D. The Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit is God, the Lord and giver of life, who was active in the Old Testament and given to the Church in fullness at Pentecost. He empowers the saints for service and witness, cleanses man from the old nature and conforms us to the image of Christ. The baptism with the Holy Spirit, subsequent to conversion, releases the fullness of the Spirit and is evidenced by the fruits and gifts of the Holy Spirit.

E. The Scripture.

We affirm that the Bible, containing the Old and New Testaments, is alone the only infallible, inspired Word of God, and that its authority is ultimate, final, and eternal. It cannot be added to, subtracted from, or superseded in any regard. The Bible is the source of all doctrine, instruction, correction and reproof. It contains all that is needed for guidance in godliness and practical Christian conduct.

F. The Atonement.

Christ's vicarious death on the cross paid the penalty for the sins of the whole world, but its benefits are only applicable to those who receive Jesus as personal Savior. We affirm that salvation is by grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ and as a covenant between the Father and the Son, we are beneficiaries of its benefits and cannot alter it by our actions.

G. Salvation.

The Word of God declares clearly that salvation is a free gift of God, based on the merits of the death of His Son, and is appropriated by faith. Salvation is affected by personal repentance, belief in the Lord Jesus (justification), and personal acceptance of Him into one's life as Lord and Savior (regeneration). The new life in Christ includes the privileges of adoption and inheritance in the kingdom of God's beloved Son. In love, God chooses man to be saved and follow Him. Salvation should produce an active lifestyle of loving obedience and service to Jesus Christ our Savior.

H. The Christian Life.

We believe that the Scriptures portray the life of the saint in this world to be one of balance between what is imputed to us as Christians and what is imparted to us according to our faith and maturity. Therefore, God's provision for His children is total, and His promises are final and forever. The shortcomings of the individual and of the church are because of the still progressing sanctification of the saints. The Christian life is filled with trials, tests, and warfare against a spiritual enemy. To remain faithful through all circumstances of life requires dependence upon the Holy Spirit and a willingness to die to personal desires and passions.

I. The Church.

The goal of the church is to make disciples of all nations through the government and the establishing of the Kingdom of God on Earth and to present the saints complete in Christ. The five-fold ministries listed in Ephesians 4 governs the church, along with the Elders and service of the deacons as mentioned in 1 Tim 3, as well as other leadership roles mentioned in Scripture. We affirm the church's purpose as offering worship to God, fellowship, ministry and instruction to itself, and evangelism and service to the world. It is essential to the life of the church that scriptural patterns of discipline are practiced and that oversight for church discipline, individual and corporate, is exercised by the leadership of the church.

J. The Priesthood of the Saints

All believers have the calling to function as a priest (God's representative) to fulfil effectively and efficiently the purpose of God in the body of Christ, their family and society as a whole.

K. Baptism and the Lord's Supper.

The Word of God places on the church two perpetual ordinances of the Lord Jesus Christ. The first, baptism, is the outward sign of what God has already done in the individual's life and is a testimony to all that the person now belongs to Jesus. It is identification with Jesus and is affected in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The Lord's Supper is a commemoration of the death of the Lord and is done in remembrance of Him until He comes again; it is a sign of our loving participation in Him. Both institutions are restricted to those who are believers.

L. Eschatology

We affirm the bodily, personal, second coming of the Lord Jesus Christ, the resurrection of the saints, the millennium, and the final judgment. The final judgment will determine the eternal status of both the saints and the unbelievers, determined by their relationship to Jesus Christ. We affirm with the Bible the final state of the new heavens and the new earth.

M. Spiritual Realm

We affirm God reigns over a spiritual realm in which a spiritual battle is taking place between the Kingdom of light and the kingdom of darkness.

N. Beginning of human life

We affirm the sanctity of human life and that life begins at the moment of conception.

O. Purity in the Church

We affirm chastity for Christian single men and women; and the sacredness of Christian marriage.

P. Marriage

We define marriage as a union between one born as a man and one born as a woman and that romantic and sexual contact between the same sex is sinful according to Romans 1: 26 – 27 and 1 Cor. 6: 9-10. Therefore, we reserve the right to marry couples that are recognized to be Biblical.

Q. Healing

Healing—body, soul and spirit—and all of God’s provisions for His saints, are provided for in the atonement, but these must be appropriated by faith.

R. Religious Exemption

In conjunction with the ministry’s Statement of Faith, Pneuma Church, Inc. believes that God has commanded that no intimate sexual activity be engaged in outside of marriage between a man and a woman. Pneuma Church, Inc. believes that any form of homosexuality, lesbianism, bisexuality, bestiality, transgender, incest, fornication, adultery, including bigamy and polygamy, and any other form of sexual immorality are sinful as defined by the Bible. We also believe that God disapproves of and forbids any attempt to alter one’s gender by surgery or appearance. (Gen. 2:24; Gen. 19:5, 13; Gen. 26:8-9; Lev. 18:1-30; Rom. 1:26-29; 1 Cor. 5:1; 6:9; 1 Thess. 4:1-8; Heb. 13:4).

Pneuma Church, Inc. and its elders reserve the right to refuse to perform any ceremony that would be contrary to the marital beliefs of Pneuma Church, Inc. Pneuma Church, Inc. also reserves the right to refuse use of facilities for any ceremony or event condoning such practices. Pneuma Church, Inc. and its ministries, including its schools, reserve the right to dismiss or not to hire anyone who, being single or married, is practicing sinful sexual behavior. Anyone professing or discovered to be practicing any form of sexual immorality contrary to the beliefs of Pneuma Church, Inc. cannot hold office or job within Pneuma Church, Inc. or its ministries or schools. Furthermore, Pneuma Church, Inc. reserves the right as a religious organization to prohibit the physical expression of such practices within our ministries. Pneuma Church, Inc. also reserves the right to remove from its property anyone who is openly exhibiting acts of sexual immorality.

NON-DISCRIMINATION POLICY

Pneuma Christian Academy admits students of any race, color, national and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the school. It does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, disability, national and ethnic origin in administration of its educational policies, admissions policies, scholarship programs, athletic programs, and other school-administered programs.

SCHOOL HOURS

8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

The school will be locked down at 9:00 a.m. Students arriving after 9:00 am will not be permitted to enter the school unless they have a doctor's note.

OFFICE HOURS

School office hours are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The office is closed on weekends, holidays, and when the school is closed. The office is open throughout the summer from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

SCHOOL CLOSURE

The school is closed on all legal holidays. Please use Alma to take note of all teacher service days when students are off from school.

If the school deems that it should close due to a weather emergency, parents will be informed via email and/or through Alma.

VISITORS

All visitors on campus must present a valid picture ID and be issued a visitor's pass to remain on campus. Visitor passes are issued at the front office and must be worn and displayed at all times while on campus.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS/WORK/PHONE NUMBERS

If you have a change of address, home telephone or business telephone number, please inform the office immediately. This is vitally important should an emergency occur, and you need to be contacted.

EMAIL

All teachers have email addresses. This is normally the most effective way to reach a teacher. You may access the directory for all teachers and staff in Alma.

MESSAGES

If you need to leave a message or speak with your child's teacher about a non-emergency issue, please contact the teacher by email or call the school office. Carpool changes should be handled by contacting the front desk staff and submitting changes in writing via email.

COMMUNICATION AND CONFERENCES

Proper communication is essential in the operation of a school. Your cooperation concerning the signing and returning of important notices and school papers will be greatly appreciated. If you have any questions regarding grades, school functions, classroom practices, or disciplinary action, please contact the school immediately.

It is important for the student to know both parents and teachers are working harmoniously for his/her welfare. Open, unwarranted criticism of school practices (or those in authority), often reap tragic results

in our children. When there is a misunderstanding, the parent should take it immediately to the teacher. Often an email or note can clear up the difficulty. If the problem remains, a three-way conference will be arranged by with the parent, the teacher, and the Principal.

The parents or teacher may request a conference at any given time. Appointments with teachers should be requested at least one day in advance. Please e-mail the teacher requesting an appointment.

LUNCH PROGRAM

All students will eat lunch on campus.

Students in K-2nd Grade must participate in PCA's Lunch Program. The only exception is a student who has an allergy documented by a doctor; a doctor's note is required.

The cost of the lunch program will be added to your account.

- Kindergarten: \$15 per week, which includes breakfast, lunch, and snacks.
- 1st and 2nd Grade: \$25 per week, which includes only lunch. Students must bring their own snacks.

Students in grades 3-8 are not required to but can participate in the Lunch Program for lunch only (not snacks or breakfast) at a cost of \$35 per week. Students in grades 3-8 who do not participate in the lunch program must bring their lunches and snacks.

Students are not allowed to use microwaves to heat up food. If you desire for your child to eat warm food, the food must be brought in a thermos by the student.

We are a peanut free school. Please refrain from sending any food that contains peanuts.

Food delivery of ANY kind to the school is not allowed. This includes parents dropping off lunch in the middle of the day or vendors such as Uber Eats, Postmates, etc. or. If your child is not enrolled in the lunch program, he/she must arrive at the school in the morning with his/her lunch. **If a student is not part of the lunch program and does not bring lunch, the student will be sent home.**

HEALTH POLICY

A copy of your child's current immunization record must be on file in order to attend. All immunization records must be kept current. The state may change its requirements from time to time; if this occurs, the school will adjust its screening policies to comply.

Any parent that has a student with a medical condition such as diabetes, asthma, allergies, etc., must make sure that this information is on file at the school.

Parents must notify appropriate school staff if your child has a serious infectious communicable disease, infections of the skin or eyes, lice or nits. A child must not be brought to school if he/she has one of the following symptoms:

- Fever
- Cough
- Headache
- Nausea

- New loss of smell or taste
- Symptoms and signs of possible severe illness [such as lethargy, uncontrolled breathing, diarrhea, vomiting (two or more episodes in 24 hours), rash with fever, wheezing or untreated persistent cough].
- Lice or nits, whether active or not.
- Diagnosis of a communicable disease; a doctor's note that the child is no longer contagious and is able to participate in the school's activities must be provided for the child to return to school.

MEDICATIONS

Medications to be administered to students at school must be turned in by the parent to the front desk staff. Students are not permitted to have medications, prescription or over the counter, on their person or in their backpacks while in school. To be given prescribed medications by the school, students must have a doctor's note with instructions to staff on how to administer medications. All prescribed medications such as an inhaler, antibiotics, Epi Pen, etc., must

- Be in the original container.
- Be labeled with the child's name.
- Include directions to administer the medication.
- Not be expired.
- Have written parental permission to administer any medication to your child.

In case of surgery, fractures, or prolonged illness, a note from the physician should be given to the office staff or the teacher regarding any limitation of activities or special consideration.

STUDENT CELL PHONES

Cell phones are prohibited while at school. If a student brings a cell phone, it must be turned off (as opposed to being placed on silent or vibrate). Transgression of this rule will result in disciplinary action. If parents need to contact their child during school hours, they can call the front office.

INTERNET AND WI-FI ACCESS

Students will have access to PCA's Wi-Fi network through the Student Wi-Fi only. Any violation of this policy, such as using VPNs or hotspots to access websites that are not accessible through the Student Wi-Fi, will be met with appropriate disciplinary action.

STUDENT DEVICES

Students in grades 3-8 are required to have Chromebooks to complete coursework. Only Chromebooks are permitted. PCA is not liable for personal loss, theft, or damage to any electronic or memory device, including memory sticks, brought to school. Furthermore, misuse of the device or violation of PCA's Internet and Wi-Fi policy will result in disciplinary measures which may include the loss of privilege to bring the device to school. Devices and Internet use can only be used at the direction of the teacher in the classroom for academic purposes.

ATTENDANCE

Absences

An absence will be considered unexcused until the parent(s) provide proper documentation to the administration that demonstrates the absence is excused. Absences are only excused if they are due to illness, doctor or dental appointments, or a death in the family. A doctor's or dentist note must be provided to the office before the absence is considered excused.

Students are only permitted 9 unexcused absences every 2 quarters, for a total of 18 unexcused absences in the entire school year. More than 18 unexcused absences in a school year will prevent the student from advancing to the next grade, regardless of how they have performed in their coursework. Students may be allowed to make-up the absences during the summer in order to be allowed to advance the grade.

After an absence, students are responsible for checking with their teachers for any make up work. Students have as many days to make up work as the number of days they were absent (i.e., if a child is sick for two days, he has two days to make up his work).

Tardies

School begins promptly at 8:00 A.M. and ends at 3:00 p.m. A student is late if not inside the classroom by 8:00 a.m. Students who arrive to school after 8:00 a.m. without a doctor's or dentist's note will be marked as unexcused. For middle school students (6th, 7th, and 8th grade), four (4) unexcused tardies count as one (1) unexcused absence. For elementary students (K-5th grade) 10 unexcused tardies count as one (1) unexcused absence.

The school will be locked down at 9:00 a.m. Students arriving after 9:00 am will not be permitted to enter the school unless they have a doctor's note.

Leaving Campus during School Hours

Students may not leave campus during school hours unless checked out by a parent. Parents must speak to the school secretary to sign students out during school hours.

STAYING AFTER SCHOOL

Students who must stay after school for tutoring or detention must be picked up by the designated time. Students who are not picked up at the proper time will be expected to pay the appropriate fee. Students are not permitted to return to the classroom after dismissal time without a teacher's permission.

If a child needs to come back to pick up things that he/she left behind, a parent needs to accompany the student to the classroom.

ARRIVAL AND DROP-OFF

Students should arrive by 7:45 a.m., when classrooms open and teachers are on duty. Students are dropped off outside the gate to the playground. Please refer to the map in Appendix A.

BEFORE CARE

Before Care will be available from 7:00 am to 7:45 a.m. only for students who have previously registered with the school. The cost is \$30 per week and includes breakfast. This cost will be added to your monthly tuition.

PICK-UP

Early pickup time is before 2:00 p.m. Students that are being picked up after 2:00 p.m. must wait until the 3:00 p.m. pick up time. Students must be picked up between 3:00 p.m. and 3:15 p.m. If your child remains at school after 3:15 p.m., your account will be charged \$1.00 per minute, per child, until you arrive.

Students will be picked up outside the gate to the playground. Please refer to the map in Appendix A.

You must wait for your child in the car. When you arrive, a staff member will call the teacher in the classroom to let her know. Your child will then come down from the classroom to meet you in your car. Only parents picking up a preschool child will be allowed to park in the parking lot. Parking outside the school fence is not allowed.

AFTER-SCHOOL CARE

If you are looking for an after-school program, we are partnering with Hope for Miami for after-school care for students K-5.

CARPOOLS

The student will be released only to an authorized parent unless the teacher or the office has received a written notice to the contrary. All arrangements for going home with other children must be made before school, and the child's teacher must be notified in writing prior to any change in the usual arrangements. Changes to carpool must be made in advance of the school day and in writing; notification to the school by phone is not acceptable except in an emergency.

PARKING

One-way lanes are only to pick up students and only for those drivers who will not be leaving their vehicles. Drivers must never leave their vehicles unattended unless they are properly parked in a parking spot. See map in Appendix A.

Unless you have a handicapped tag, do not park in any handicapped spaces.

PROGRESS REPORTS AND REPORT CARDS

Student progress reports are available at the end of the first four weeks of each quarter. At the end of each quarter, student reports cards are available through Alma and emailed to parents.

Parents will receive final report card via email or through Alma approximately one week after the last day of school. Progress reports and unofficial report cards are available throughout the year online via Alma.

Final Report cards and all other student records will be withheld if tuition or other charges and fees are not current.

Parents are responsible for monitoring student grades in Alma. It is also important for parents to understand that grades in Ignitia are in progress, and that they should monitor grades in Alma since those are official progress reports and final grades.

Parents are required to activate their account in Alma.

Elective Classes

Elective classes are held once a week for K-8th grade. Students will participate in music, arts classes, and conversational Spanish.

Physical Education

Classes emphasize sports and games appropriate for each age level. Children play kickball, volleyball, soccer, basketball, and flag football. Physical conditioning exercises are utilized in each class.

Restriction of Activities

If there are any medical conditions which restrict a student's activity in P.E. classes or sports in general,

instructions in writing signed by the parent must be furnished to the teacher or the office at the beginning of the school year or as soon as medical condition is diagnosed.

Rules for P.E. Class

No jewelry (including watches) may be worn to P.E. class. Students must wear athletic shoes with normal soles. No platform or extra-wide soles are permitted. Students who do not comply with the P.E. uniform policy will have their P.E. grade reduced and may, at the teacher 's discretion, be excluded from participation in the day's P.E. activities. Students who persist in being out of uniform for P E. class may be subject to other disciplinary action

Grade Acceleration / Demotion

Students may be given advanced course work at the same grade level. Students may only be assigned course work from a higher grade level if they pass all examinations for the lower grade level. Students may also be demoted to a lower course if it is considered that they would benefit from revisiting foundational material to improve their learning outcomes.

Grade Retention / Failing a Class

Retention will only be considered when all strategies for remediation have been implemented and documented, but have failed to prepare the student to enter the next grade level. When a teacher is considering the recommendation of retention, all necessary administrative personnel will be involved in the discussion and decision-making process.

If at the end of the school year a student has failed a course, the student must complete credit recovery in Summer School. The coursework must be completed over the summer. Coursework cannot be transferred over from the previous school year.

Evaluation for Learning / Behavioral Need

PCA is interested in the academic progress of all of its students. A teacher will always use various strategies for remediation and/or behavior management, including parental involvement and intervention from the Principal and/or the Academic Coordinator. If after these interventions, the academic team composed of the teacher, the Principal, and/or the Academic Coordinator believe that the child may have a learning or behavioral need, parents will be required to have the student evaluated by the appropriate professional.

School Supplies

Your tuition and registration do not include school supplies. At the time of enrollment, a list of supplies required for each grade is provided. These items should be brought to the Open House meeting scheduled at the beginning of the school year or dropped off at the school the week before school starts

FIELD TRIPS

All students must have a signed permission form from their parent to participate in a field trip. Parents are welcome on most school field trips as chaperones or volunteers; however, space on school vehicles is limited, and they may have to provide their own transportation. Additionally, some entrances allow a limited number of adults per students. Parents must remember the teacher is in charge of the group

while on a trip.

PARENT / ADULT PARTICIPANT IN FIELD TRIP

Parents who are traveling with the school on field trips must sign a statement of cooperation, which reflects our school's policies and Christian testimony. If you have any questions about any of the statements below, please see or call the trip leader prior to the trip for clarification. In order to participate in the field trip, it will be necessary for each parent/adult participant to agree to comply with the agreement.

Trip guidelines for parents:

- There is a no smoking/vaping policy on all school trips
- There is a no alcohol consumption policy on all school trips.
- Dress must be modest and conform to the student dress code for all trips.
- There should be no profanity on any school trip.

Parents are not allowed to change any trip activity nor may they give permission for students to participate in any activity not approved by the trip leader.

COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS/ VOLUNTEER HOURS

Middle school students will be required to complete 20 hours of community service by serving at their church or at PCA Serve Days.

Parent Requirements

Parents need to volunteer a minimum of 10 hours each school year on PCA Serve Days or at any PCA school event. All volunteers must check in with the school office upon entering the campus. All volunteers must coordinate their activities with the teachers and/or designated staff.

Three hours of parenting training/workshops is required each year during the school year for each custodial parent or guardian. A schedule of training sessions/workshops will be published in Alma.

DRUGS, ALCOHOL, AND TOBACCO

Pneuma Christian Academy is a drug-free zone; therefore, drugs, alcohol, and tobacco are not permitted in the buildings or on the grounds at any time. This includes odorless cigarettes or pipes.

The Administration and Staff of Pneuma Christian Academy is dedicated to preventing and eliminating substance abuse on school property and at school-sponsored activities. The use or possession of illegal drugs or illegal mood-altering substances, alcoholic beverages, drug-related paraphernalia, vaping devices and paraphernalia or the abuse of prescription or over the counter drugs by any student on school property or while attending or participating in any school-sponsored activity or at any time the student is forbidden. Transgression of this rule will result in disciplinary action, which may include expulsion from the school, even for a first offense. Any student selling drugs on school property or at school functions may be immediately expelled. In the enforcement of this policy the school may also conduct random searches as set forth in this handbook.

Students will be randomly selected for the drug testing throughout the year or if a reasonable suspicion exists. If a student takes any action to avoid, manipulate or interfere with the test or the test results, it will be considered a positive result and disciplinary action will be taken.

If a student tests positive, a parent/guardian will be contacted directly by the Dean and a meeting will be scheduled. The parents will receive an explanation of the test results, to include the type of drug, level of use, and window of time of use. Refusal to participate in such a test may result in expulsion from the school. Any student who voluntarily seeks help for substance abuse will receive confidential assistance and referral. The Administration will seek appropriate parental and counselor involvement to assist the student.

If a student tests positive because of a urine drug test, and the student's parent protests the test, the student will be required to submit to a controlled substance screening blood test at a recognized medical facility or laboratory at the parents' expense. A blood test will provide specific details as to any controlled substance, including nicotine, that may be present in the student's system and the level of concentration. The student must submit to the blood test within 72 hours of being notified by the administration and show proof of such.

Students who test positive because of a drug screening conducted by the school will face disciplinary action up to dismissal from school.

SEARCH POLICY

The Principal and/or the Dean are authorized in the presence of two witnesses to search a student's person and belongings if he/she suspects the student has illegal or unauthorized items. The search may be conducted without the student's or parents' permission. Registration of the student in Pneuma Christian Academy constitutes parental permission to such searches. The search will include backpacks, purses, pockets, lockers, desks, etc.

OFF-CAMPUS CONDUCT

Pneuma Christian Academy students are expected to maintain Christian conduct off campus as well as on campus. Attendance and/or participating in an event in which alcohol and/or drug activity occurs may lead to dismissal from school.

STUDENT WEBSITES AND SOCIAL NETWORKING

Pneuma Christian Academy has deemed that the inappropriate use of social networking websites (i.e., Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, Snap Chat or group texts, etc.) is not compatible with the purpose and mission of the school. Any student found using these sites in an inappropriate manner which contrasts with the school's conduct standards, moral standards will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including dismissal from the school.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Academic integrity means honesty and responsibility in your schoolwork. All work and all grades should result from the student's own understanding and effort. Academic dishonesty can take a number of

forms including, but not limited to:

- Cheating: Using or attempting to use unauthorized assistance, information, or study aids in any academic exercise; copying answers from another student's work.
- Plagiarizing: using someone else's work or ideas as if they were your own.

PHYSICAL CONTACT/IMMORALITY

Demonstration of romantic involvement between students on the school campus or at school events is forbidden. Hand holding, embracing, kissing, or any other contact that would contribute to undue familiarity will not be tolerated. This type of behavior will result in suspension or expulsion.

In accordance with the school's recognition of Biblical authority, no immoral conduct will be tolerated, including identifying statements related to immoral conduct. The Bible strictly forbids immoral conduct and the advocacy for such sinful behavior. (1 Thess. 4:1-8) An identifying statement is defined as a statement that a student is sexually active, or words to that effect, or language or behavior that a reasonable person would believe is intended to convey that a student engages in or has a propensity or intent to engage in immoral and/or sexual acts. Participating in or immoral conduct or sexual activity is incompatible with enrollment at a Christian school and is a basis for dismissal

BULLYING

Pneuma Christian Academy prohibits all bullying on school premises, at school-sponsored functions or activities, or while students are being transported by any means of transportation provided or supported by the school.

Any student who believes he or she has been or is currently the victim of bullying may report the situation to the Principal, the Dean, or a teacher.

HUMAN DIGNITY / HARASSMENT

We expect all persons to treat each other with respect because they are made to reflect God Himself.

- Conduct, whether intentional or not, that subjects another person to unwanted attention, comments, or actions because of race, national origin, age, gender, physical characteristics, or disability is not permitted.
- Any form of ridicule of others based on but not limited to race, gender, physical characteristics, ability, family background, or similar feature is harassment. Persons engaging in this misbehavior will be disciplined.
- Any student who believes he/ she has been the subject of harassment should report it immediately to a teacher, a Dean, or the Principal.
- Any student, parent, or teacher who experiences or observes harassment in any form at the school must report it immediately
- Reports of harassment and subsequent investigations will be handled discreetly to avoid embarrassment of the person making the report or of a person who may be unjustly accused.
- Any student who is determined to have violated this policy will be subject to corrective action and discipline, including the possibility of expulsion.

SCHOOL RULES

Reasonable rules have been established for safety and proper character development of all PCA students. Each teacher may set additional rules for expected behavior in that classroom. We encourage parents to review with their children the classroom rules and the Code of Conduct as an opportunity to understand specific standards and address any concerns.

Areas Off Limits to Students

The following areas are off limits to students unless they have a teacher's permission:

- Offices
- Kitchen
- Any building before 7:45 a.m. and after 3:30 p.m. Students are only allowed if assisting in Extended Care or for special meeting
- Teachers' desk areas or files
- All storage buildings, rooms, and cabinets
- The church sanctuary beyond the doors at the bottom of the stairs
- Main office and Copy room (unless sent by teacher)
- Science closet
- Storage or janitor's closets

CODE OF CONDUCT

To assure the right of each student to receive a quality education which best brings glory to God, we have established a code of conduct for the students at PCA.

1. The first principle that the students need to learn is **obedience**. There are three (3) points to obedience
 - a. Doing **what** one is told.
 - b. Doing it **when** one is told.
 - c. Doing it with the **right** attitude.
2. The second principle is **respect**. This is fundamental to getting along with people. It starts in the home with attitudes towards parents and siblings. These same attitudes carry over into school. At PCA, **we will not tolerate disrespect of any kind, including public criticism**. If an administrative decision is made, it is final and the issue needs to be dropped.
3. The third principle is **responsibility**. This is when a person is given things to do and has developed the self-discipline to get the job done.

The following offenses and disciplines will be strictly enforced:

Category 1 - (All discipline handled by the teacher, in the classroom)

- Talking without permission
- Self-correctable dress code issues
- Outside of class without a pass
- Writing notes in class
- Chewing gum littering
- Throwing objects / classroom disruption
- Failure to have all materials for class

- Having symbols or other offensive or objectionable drawings or words on books or materials
- Wearing caps/ Hoods indoors
- Bringing toys or electronic devices to school including aftercare
- Horseplay (During class or in-between classes)
- Committing acts of minor disrespect such as facial, vocal or physical reactions
- Failure to follow directions
- Not following the Golden Rule (Matthew 7:12)

Category 2 - (Handled by the teacher and/or Principal with in-school or out of-school-detention, with an e-mail/phone call home.)

- Any Category 1 infraction a student commits a second time or more.
- Excessive tardiness to class (3) in a quarter.
- Disrespect of another student or staff member
- Leaving assigned area or classroom without permission
- Lying or acts of dishonesty
- Use of dirty gesture
- Foul language
- Parking violation
- -Minor public displays of affection including hand holding, hugging, or kissing.
- Disrespect to those in authority (administrators)
- Dress code violations that require intervention from administration
- Misuse of others or their property
- Frequent critical or derogatory remarks to others
- Using or writing improper language (extreme)
- Forging a parent's signature
- Plagiarism/cheating, will also result in academic penalty (HW, Classwork, Quiz or Test)
- Using an electronic device without permission, or at an unapproved time or location

Category 3 – In School Suspension or out of school suspension (Dean and/or Principal must be involved with a parent meeting or phone call).

The circumstances surrounding an infraction will be considered in determining the length and time of the suspension. All suspensions are considered unexcused absences. Tests and makeup work might receive an academic penalty at the discretion of administration.

- Bullying and Harassment in person, writing, or social media (as defined in the handbook)
- Physical altercation
- Tampering or damaging school, another student's, or teacher's property
- Skipping Class
- Excessive dress code violations
- Repetition of category 2 or 3 actions
- Publicly criticizing school polices and or staff
- Stealing
- Carry or using tobacco, e-cigarettes, or any vapor products on or off campus
- In possession of any illegal item
- Pretending to use or have drugs, legal or illegal
- Pulling fire alarm
- Possession of or posting lewd material on campus including access via the internet
- Bringing fireworks to school
- Breaking in or vandalizing the campus or property

- Threat of physical abuse to teacher, staff, student or property
- Possession of incendiary materials or device
- Bringing or pretending to have alcoholic beverages on or off campus
- Acts of sexual immorality on or off campus (including social media)
- Carrying sharp objects or any kind of weapon

Category 4 - Expulsion (Headmaster and Dean will meet with parents)

- Repetition of any Category 3 action
- Bringing any item to school that could be determined to be a weapon with intent to cause harm.
- Bringing any illegal items to school with intent to use or resale.
- Excessive acts of violence

DRESS CODE

Students will be permitted to attend class only if they are dressed in a complete PCA uniform. Any student who comes to school without a complete uniform will be required to call their parents to bring proper clothing and will not be permitted in class until properly attired.

Students should write their names on the inside of all uniform wear to prevent loss.

Additional Dress Code Provisions

- o All shirts and polos must be neatly tucked in.
- o Students may ONLY wear the PCA cardigan (girls) or jacket (boys).
- o Girls' skirt length will be no shorter than the top of the knee.
- o Girls may wear only white or grey tights under the school uniform.
- o Boy shorts will be no shorter than 2 inches above the knee.
- o Shirts must be tucked in and buttoned fully, excluding the very top button.
- o Students are not permitted to wear jeans with rips or tears anywhere, short shorts, leggings, jeggings, spaghetti strap tops, exposed mid drift, pajama bottoms, sleeveless shirts, or any inappropriate words or phrases on clothing. Oversized or undersized clothing is not permitted.
- o Tennis shoes that have wheels or platforms are not allowed.

o Piercings and jewelry

- o Boys are not allowed to have pierced body parts or wear earrings.
- o Girls are allowed to wear one earring in each ear lobe. No other body piercings are allowed in either male or female students.

o Temporary or permanent tattoos are not allowed.

o Hair

- o Hair must be neat and well-groomed. Hair styles that disrupt the learning environment (Mohawks, spiked, etc.) are not allowed.
- o Hair dyes that can be considered an unnatural hair color or bleached are not allowed.
- o Boys' hair will be neatly trimmed off the eyebrows and collar with the entire ear showing. Boys are also not allowed to have lines, or any type of design shaved into their hair. Boys are not permitted to use a band or any item to hold their hair up; older boys must be clean-shaven at all times.
- o Students violating the hair code may be asked not to return to class until they meet the hair code.

o Older girls may wear make-up that is simple and tasteful. Make-up must be applied only at home.

o Hats and head scarves may not be worn.

o All students will wear PCA uniforms for all field trips unless otherwise approved by the school administration.

BIRTHDAYS

Birthday parties during school hours are only permitted from 2:00 p.m. -3:00 p.m. If your child chooses to give out birthday invitations at school, there must be an invitation for every member of the class or for all the boys or for all the girls. You may send a treat such as individually wrapped cookies or cupcakes. If you are ordering pizza for your child's birthday party, you must first let the office know what company is delivering the pizza and what time it is being delivered.

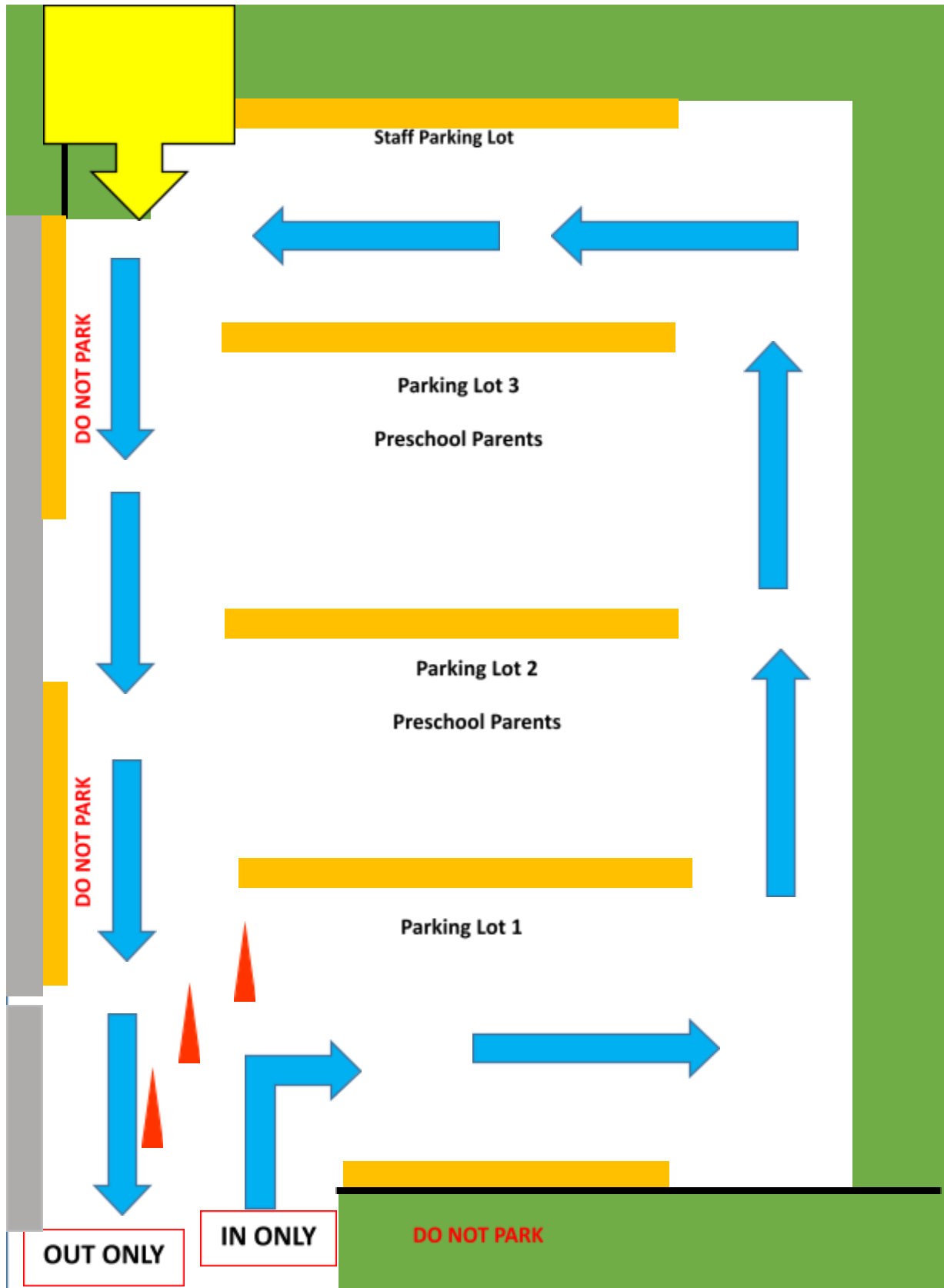
Please note that we may need to include additional regulations for these events for health reasons.
